

Calcutta Cinema Halls and Us

Calcutta Heritage Collective has an important role to play vis à vis heritage in terms of spreading awareness and even direct intervention for preservation. The post-independence and post-colonial period in Calcutta/Kolkata is witness to many grand buildings being torn down to accommodate buildings which fit into new visions of space, economics, commerce and utility. The Senate House of the University of Calcutta built in 1872 and demolished in 1960, is one such

notable example. We cannot turn our eyes away from the inevitable march of history and its inevitable reordering of civic realities and its creation of new civic values.

In the Western world however, commitment to the preservation of heritage buildings is part of public policy. Hence if one visits Vienna or Prague one has a sense of their continuous history, inscribed in the history of their buildings and evolving architectural narratives.

Within the context of this argument, I would like to draw attention to the many cinema halls of the Dharmatollah area whose dereliction is part of the tragic demise of a popular nineteenth and twentieth century bhadralok practice in Bengal of visiting theatre and cinema halls. The names of Elite, Minerva, Globe, Lighthouse and New Empire ring through my mind like so many sonorous bells. Many happy and fulfilled moments of my childhood and teenage years are tied to these magnificent cinema halls. We all know that The Lighthouse is now a Mall, a fact causing sadness as I pass by it every day.



Conservation Trivia

Buildings with architectural significance and historical values are considered for their preservation and conservation. For this purpose an inventory of such buildings upon which the heritage status has been conferred is drawn up by the expert committee formed by the Government of West Bengal. The Corporation with the recommendation of the Heritage Conservation Committee has prepared a Graded List of Heritage Buildings for Grade-I, Grade-IIA & Grade-IIB Buildings

Down Memory Lane

Our heritage is an intrinsic part of us, it simmers and bubbles at the very core of our being. Places where our ancestors lived and worked, the food they ate, the objects they used — these are all very much an essential part of what we are made up of.

I think often of my paternal grandfather's journey. He was born into an ordinary middle-class family in Comilla, East Bengal. Because he was a good student, he was singled out as a prospective groom for their daughter by one of the most prominent families of Bengal, and then went to England to complete his Medical studies. He joined the British Indian Army during WW1 as a Medical Officer and went to Mesopotamia, coming back with carpets and rugs (as he'd become quite the 'saheb') instead of gold, much to my grandmother's disappointment. He settled down eventually in Patna and was given the title of Rai bahadur by the colonial government — a title he never used and a document he hid at the back of his cupboard.

When I was young I spent many sunlit days in the house he built. I remember being fascinated by the beautiful old furniture he had collected over the years to fill his home, and that fascination has stayed with me ever since. I hold on to our heritage through old furniture and through the stories they tell. ~Kasturi Khaitan


Sandip Nowlakha is an entrepreneur who has studied Hotel Management in Switzerland and his experience spans across

Did you know? Malkhanas are rooms inside police stations where seized articles are stored to preserve them. Majority of these malkhanas have a manual register where an officer in charge - referred to as the "Malkhana Babu" makes the entries. The malkhanas in 79 city police stations contain seized articles, some of which are over half-a-century old. Several police stations like Burrabazar and Posta have a large quantity of demonetised notes and gold jewellery that need to be preserved, said an officer in Lalbazar. Similarly, many police stations have 20-30-year-old arms that can be disposed of following a uniform rule. Some items on record are 1974, Alipore- Rs 2,059.74 seized in a theft case; 1982, Gariahat - a gold chain seized in connection with a cheating case; 1994, Amherst Street -Rs 12 left unclaimed after a road accident. As part of a project announced by Calcutta police commissioner Soumen Mitra, renovations have started and the Calcutta police get a chance to restore and preserve the old and important seized items of the past few decades. Interesting objects and stories are sure to emerge and are looked forward to.

The prestigious Award was given at the annual event of Fulcrum Awards which recognized work relating to communications and advertising in different categories. Rajiv's journey began in 1975 and covered free-lance journalism, photography, banking, advertising, public relations, marketing communications and corporate branding.
